

Growing Your Double Reed Section

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WHY DOUBLE REEDS

- Complete aesthetic experience in Band
 - o Expands your instrumentation, range of timbres
 - Expands your literature options independent parts for double reeds
 - o Expands solo and ensemble options
- Invest in your students' future
 - Educational and Scholarship opportunities
 - o Always in demand collegiate and community ensembles

CHARACTERISTICS - WHO AND WHEN

Because you will likely have very few double reed instruments compared to the other woodwinds, you will want to select potential oboists and bassoonists carefully.

Who - Personality Traits

- Curious, patient
- Problem Solvers
- Hardworking, intelligent
- Individualistic
- Discerning ear

- Oboe diva (lots of solos lots of attention)
- Bassoon team player (rarely solos – needs to blend and support)

Who - Physical Traits

- Both instruments have a larger-than-average spread between fingers
- Bassoon weight and size of the instrument is a concern for beginners
- Choose students whose physical weakness on their current instrument could actually be helped on a double reed. For example:
 - Flute: good sound, technique, but unable to sustain long enough phrases could work better on double reed
 - <u>Clarinet</u>: good support, dexterity, but unable to consistently find the high enough position needed in the mouth (ee-oo) – double reeds use a lower, more neutral position

WHEN - STARTING VS. SWITCHING

Starting

Benefits

- Puts double reed students on equal footing with peers
- More time to develop their skills
- Integration of double reeds earlier rest of the band benefits

Challenges

- Physical size (especially bassoon)
- Limited Equipment
 - Access to Instruments
 - Access to Reeds

Strategies for success

- Utilize elementary classroom and music teachers
 - o Can give insight into a student's musical and mental aptitude
 - o Insight (possibly) into a student's family/financial situation
 - o Targeted selection can help reduce attrition
- Start students with previous musical experience (i.e. piano lessons)

Switching

Benefits

- Gives students more time to grow; better able to handle weight and finger span of double reed instruments
- Fills out your instrumentation
- Allows students to gain musical experience before introducing challenges of double reeds
- Doubling on instruments offers more performance opportunities

Challenges

- Students switching are behind their peers it's harder to be bad at something while everyone else is ahead
- Are they still required to play another instrument (i.e. marching band requirements)? More instruments equals:
 - More time
 - More money

Strategies for Success

- Select someone who is already demonstrating success on current instrument
- Switch from other woodwind instruments
- Focus on similarities rather than differences

RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION STRATEGIES

- Actively recruit these instruments
 - Bring in students, professionals and/or groups to demonstrate both instruments
 - o Play videos of exciting groups like The Breaking Winds Bassoon Quartet
 - Start students in pairs
 - o Switch someone who will contribute to the band for years
- Create a district-wide double reed class
- Financial Assistance
 - o Subsidize or pay for private lessons, reeds
- Help find private instructors
 - Skype/Facetime lessons
 - Recorded lessons
- Create a list of Endangered Instruments for your program
 - o Seattle Youth Symphony Orchestra Endangered Instruments Program
 - o https://syso.org/programs/endangered-instruments/
- Marching Band is this required for double reed students?
 - o Engage double reed students during the marching band season
 - Chamber music
 - Solo music
 - Mentor programs
 - Do not overload double reed students
- Encourage students to participate in honor ensembles/summer camps
